**I. Overview**

**II. Definitions**

Applicant: Entity that submits an application for federal financial assistance under this notice of funding opportunity.

Application Packet: Complete written response of the applicant to the notice of federal financial assistant funding opportunity including properly completed forms, supporting documents and attachments.

Business days: Monday through Friday, excluding federal and state holidays.

Business hours: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. eastern standard time on business days.

Calendar days: All days, including weekends and holidays.

Commissioner: Commissioner of Agriculture for the State of Florida.

Domestic Food: means a product grown, processed, and otherwise prepared for sale or distribution exclusively in the United States or its territories, except with respect to minor ingredients. Minor ingredients from nondomestic sources will be allowed to be utilized as a United States product if such ingredients are not otherwise: (1) produced in the United States; and (2) commercially available in the United States at fair and reasonable prices from domestic sources. The following ingredients are determined by AMS Commodity Procurement as not available at fair and reasonable prices and are waived from U.S. origin restrictions: (1) Vitamin A (Retinol Palmitate), (2) Vitamin D, (3) Carageenan (stabilizing agent), (4) Sorbic Acid (preservative), (5) Potassium Sorbate (preservative), (6) Rennet (coagulant), (7) Items excepted from the Buy American Act under FAR 25.104 Nonavailable Articles. Domestic food or domestic agricultural commodity are interchangeable.

FDACS: Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, an agency of the State of Florida.

Grant Manager: An employee of FDACS, who is designated to be responsible for the monitoring and management of the subrecipient agreement.

Local Government: A county government, a municipality (an incorporated city, town, or village), a school board district or an independent special district.

Local or regional food: Locally and Regionally Produced Food means food that is raised, produced, aggregated, stored, processed, and distributed in the locality or region where the final product is marketed to consumers, so that the total distance that the product travels between the farm or ranch where the product originates and the point of sale to the end consumer is at most 400 miles, or both the final market and the origin of the product are within the same State, territory, or tribal land.

Local or regional producers: Local or Regional means farmers, ranchers, producer, processors or distributors and other businesses involved in food production or distribution that are located in the state or tribal region or within 400 miles of the delivery destination.

National School Lunch Program (NSLP). The National School Lunch Program is a federally assisted meal program operating in public and nonprofit private schools and residential childcare institutions. It provides nutritionally balanced, low-cost, or free lunches to children each school day.

Non-profit Organization: An organization which has filed an application with Florida's Secretary of State for nonprofit corporate status pursuant to Chapter 617, Florida Statutes, and has been issued a federal employer identification number by the Internal Revenue Service.

Schools: 7 CFR 210.2: School means: (a) An educational unit of high school grade or under, recognized as part of the educational system in the state and operating under public or nonprofit private ownership in a single building or complex of buildings; (b) any public or nonprofit private classes of preprimary grade when they are conducted in the aforementioned schools; or (c) any public or nonprofit private residential child care institution, or distinct part of such institution, which operates principally for the care of

children, and, if private, is licensed to provide residential child care services under the appropriate licensing code by the state or a subordinate level of government, except for residential summer camps which participate in the Summer Food Service Program for Children, Job Corps centers funded by the Department of Labor, and private foster homes. The term “residential childcare institutions” includes but is not limited to: homes for the mentally, emotionally or physically impaired, and unmarried mothers and their infants; group homes; halfway houses; orphanages; temporary shelters for abused children and for runaway children; long-term care facilities for chronically ill children; and juvenile detention centers. A long-term care facility is a hospital, skilled nursing facility, intermediate care facility, or distinct part thereof, which is intended for the care of children confined for 30 days or more.

School Breakfast Program (SBP): The School Breakfast Program is a federally funded program that helps participating schools provide breakfast to all students.

Socially Disadvantaged producers: Socially Disadvantaged Farmer or Rancher is a farmer or rancher who is a member of a Socially Disadvantaged Group. A Socially Disadvantaged Group is a group whose members have been subject to discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, disability, and, where applicable, sex, marital status, familial status, parental status, religion, sexual orientation, genetic information, political beliefs, reprisal, or because all or a part of an individual's income is derived from any public assistance program.

Small Business. A small business is generally defined by the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) as a business that is: a for profit-businesses of any legal structure; independently owned and operated, not nationally dominant in its field, and physically located and operated in the U.S. or its territories.

Subrecipient Agreement: Formal agreement that will be awarded to the successful applicant under this notice of federal financial assistance funding opportunity.

### **III. Federal Financial Assistance Funding Opportunity Description**

#### **Introduction**

The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS) was awarded a cooperative agreement from the USDA for the Florida Local Food for Schools Cooperative Agreement Program (LFS). The purpose of this grant is to increase economic opportunities for Florida producers (i.e., farmers or ranchers), targeting socially disadvantaged and small business producers, while increasing access to fresh produce in Florida’s rural schools. This will be accomplished by connecting targeted producers with Florida schools participating in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) or the School Breakfast Program (SBP), specifically those in Florida’s 32 rurally designated counties (see Appendix 1 for a map of eligible schools within Florida’s 32 rurally designated counties per Florida Statute 288.0656(2)(e)).

The State will administer the LFS program funds through a competitive grant program allowing eligible Florida based organizations and institutions to apply for Florida’s LFS funds. FDACS program staff will engage with awarded applicants to foster sustainable new markets for purchasing state products, especially from socially disadvantaged and small business producers, for distribution in rural schools.

## Eligibility Information

Applicants may come from private or public, for-profit, or nonprofit entities. Applicants should show evidence of existing community or industry support and engagement.

The applicant must be actively registered in the System of Award Management (SAM) <https://sam.gov/SAM/> at the time of application submission.

## Grant Requirements

Applicants must be Florida based organizations or institutions able to partner with FDACS to identify Florida producers, targeting socially disadvantaged and small business producers, for the purpose of purchasing local or regional food (see Section II Definitions for more information on local or regional food).

FDACS will require that **a minimum of 75% of funds allocated to the applicant be used for the purchase of food and be expended directly from socially disadvantaged and small business producers.** Awarded applicants must purchase products from local or regional producers and all products purchased must be local or regional food (see Section II Definitions for information on local and regional producers and products). Eligible beneficiaries of purchases must be local or regional producers.

Minor ingredients from nondomestic sources will be allowed to be utilized as a domestic product if such ingredients are not otherwise: (1) produced in the United States; and (2) commercially available in the United States at fair and reasonable prices from domestic sources. The following ingredients are determined by The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) Commodity Procurement as not available at fair and reasonable prices and are waived from U.S. origin restrictions: (1) Vitamin A (Retinol Palmitate), (2) Vitamin D, (3) Carageenan (stabilizing agent), (4) Sorbic Acid (preservative), (5) Potassium Sorbate (preservative), (6) Rennet (coagulant), (7) Items excepted from the Buy American Act under FAR 25.104 Nonavailable Articles.

This grant requires distributions to Florida's rural schools currently participating in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and/or the School Breakfast Program (SBP); therefore, work must be performed within the State of Florida. Applicants must have the capability to ensure purchased commodities are distributed to Florida schools, targeting eligible schools within Florida's 32 rurally designated counties. See Appendix 1 for map of eligible schools in Florida's rurally designated counties per Florida Statute 288.0656(2)(e).

**All commodities purchased through LFS must be utilized for the National School Lunch Program and/or the School Breakfast Program. FDACS will require that 100% of the recipient schools be in rurally designated counties. Funding will be allocated based on the counties served. A list of eligible counties and their corresponding allocations are listed in Appendix 1. All listed schools within the county must be served.**

**Preference will be given to applicants who are able to serve schools in a minimum of two (2) counties. If no applications are received or awarded for a county, FDACS may readvertise this funding opportunity for those particular counties.**

Awarded applicants will be required to enter into a signed contract with FDACS for the duration of this grant program. A draft contract is provided as Appendix 1, Federal Financial Assistance Subrecipient Agreement. By submission of a response, Applicant agrees to the contract conditions set forth therein.

Upon award notification, awardees must register their current Federal Employer Identification Number (FEIN) and mailing address at [www.MyFloridaMarketplace.com](http://www.MyFloridaMarketplace.com) and complete the Department of Financial Services (DFS) required Substitute Form w-9.

**VI. Statutes and Regulations**

The Local Food for Schools Cooperative Agreement Program (LFS) is authorized by section 5(c) of the Commodity Credit Corporation Charter Act (15 USC 714c(c)).

**VII. Award Information**

Total amount of funding available	\$11,459,410.00
Anticipated number of awards	Maximum of 32 awards, one per rural county. Preference will be given to applicants who purpose serving two (2) or more counties.
Anticipated Period of Performance	10/01/2023 – 01/31/2025: Awardees will be given a planning period, before food purchases and distributions are required to begin, for school menu planning based on anticipated produce and commodity availability.

The award allocation for each county was calculated by multiplying total lunch enrollment claimed in the previous school year times \$79.43 (per student).

Amendments to award amounts may occur, depending on initial demand for the program and the availability of funds. Final adjustments may occur to the award once the application due date has closed. After initial awards are made, FDACS will determine the best course of action to redistribute any remaining funds.

**Funding will be allocated based on the counties served. A list of eligible counties and their corresponding allocations are listed in Appendix 1. All listed schools within the county must be served.**

**VIII. Cost Sharing (Matching) Requirements**

Cost Sharing (Matching) is not required for this federal financial assistance funding opportunity.

**IX. Funding Source and/or Restrictions**

FDACS reserves the right to award, or not award, subrecipient agreement(s) based on the availability of federal funds.

FDACS' obligation to pay under this subrecipient agreement is contingent upon funding by the federal agency.

Funding is available for project work initiated and completed during the award period.

Funding is subject to the amount of spending authority allocated by the Florida Legislature.

The allowability of costs shall be in accordance with the federal financial assistance cost principles applicable to the subrecipient.

**X. Cost of Preparation**

FDACS is not liable for any costs incurred by the applicant in response to the notice of federal financial assistance funding opportunity.

**XI. Public Records**

Article 1, section 24, Florida Constitution, guarantees every person access to all public records, and Section 119.011, Florida Statutes, provides a broad definition of public record. As such, all responses to a federal financial assistance funding opportunity are

public records unless exempt by law. Any applicant claiming that its response contains information that is exempt from the public records law shall clearly segregate and mark that information and provide the specific statutory citation for such exemption.

## **XIII. General Instructions for Application Packet**

Carefully review all materials and prepare the responses accordingly.

The application packet must be complete and provide all the required information by the submission deadline to be considered. Application packets that fail to provide all the required forms and signatures will be considered non-responsive and consequently will be removed from the evaluation process.

For all corporate applicants, proof of corporate status must be provided with the application.

For nonprofit applicants, documentation that verifies the official nonprofit status of an organization in accordance with Chapter 617, Florida Statutes, must be provided with the application.

Please ensure that all attachments reflect the applicant's name and funding opportunity number.

Unless otherwise noted, application packets must be submitted on 8 ½" by 11" plain white paper with 1" margins, using Tahoma 12-point font and one-sided single-spaced pages. Pages must be consecutively numbered for ease of reading.

## **XIV. Application Package Components**

FDACS forms must be used. Substitute forms will not be reviewed. Do not alter the pages unless the page indicates that it can be modified. Applications that do not include all required pages may be removed from the evaluation process.

**XV. Clarifications/Revisions**

Before award, FDACS reserves the right to seek clarifications or request any information deemed necessary for proper evaluation of submissions from all applicants deemed eligible for the subrecipient agreement. Failure to provide requested information may result in rejection of the application.

**XVI. Rejection of Applications**

FDACS reserves the right to reject any and all applications or waive any minor irregularities when to do so would be in the best interest of the State of Florida, and to reject the proposal of an applicant whom FDACS determines is not in a position to perform the scope of work. Minor irregularities are those which will not have a significant or adverse effect on overall completion or performance.

**XVII. Unique Sam ID**

Applicants are required to provide a unique SAM ID number on the application.

**XVIII. System for Award Management (SAM) Registration**

The applicant must be registered in the System of Award Management (SAM) <https://sam.gov/SAM/>. The applicant will be required to maintain a registration for the duration of the award. Applicants who have an active exclusion may not be eligible for award.

**XIX. Late Applications**

Applications, hard copy or email, received by FDACS after the application submission deadline will be rejected as untimely.

**XX. Evaluation Criteria**

An initial review of all applications will be completed and applications failing to submit all required information will be removed from consideration.

Each application will be evaluated and scored based on the criteria listed below.

- a. Project Narrative: Up to 45 points will be awarded based upon the extent to which the project narrative demonstrates a clear understanding of the grant purpose and the expected project outcomes. The applicant's project narrative score will be based upon the following criteria:
  - Does the applicant provide a statement as to the need for the federal financial assistance? (2 Points)
  - Does the applicant tie the need for assistance to the purpose of the grant? (2 Points)
  - Are the expected project outcomes related to the purpose of the grant? (3 Points)

- Does the applicant provide details as to the implementation strategies? (4 Points)
  - Does the applicant provide a timeline which coincides with the award period? (4 points)
  - Does the applicant provide a plan for project sustainability? Refer to the submitted application's Project Narrative Question 4. (5 Points).
  - Does the applicant have the ability to distribute 100% of purchased food to rural, Florida schools, as defined in Appendix 1? (5 Points)
  - Does the applicant identify two (2) or more counties for food distribution(s)? (10 points)
  - Are all identified partners Florida based (2 points)?
  - Has the applicant indicated they have the capacity to ensure purchased products meet the USDA's definition of local or regional food? (2 Points)
  - Did the applicant provide a description on how they will identify and partner with socially disadvantaged and small business producers? (4 Points)
  - Is the applicant able to provide required reports and engage in data collection on food purchasing and distribution? (2 Points)
- b. Scope of Work: Up to 20 points will be awarded based upon the goals, measurable activities and deliverables presented in the scope of work. The application must include a clear and complete plan for the project. The applicant's scope of work score will be based upon the following criteria:
- Does the applicant describe specific project activities and deliverables? (8 Points)
  - Do the activities and deliverables relate to the project narrative? (3 Points)
  - Is the timeline for each task reasonable? (2 Points)
  - Does the applicant provide staff names as to who is responsible for completing each task? (5 Points)
  - Is the scope of work feasible for completion during the award period? (2 Points)
- c. Budget Plan Narrative: Up to 25 points will be awarded based upon the relationship between the scope of work and the itemized budget narrative. The application must demonstrate the need and reasonableness of the projected costs. The applicant's budget narrative score will be based upon the following criteria:
- Did the applicant provide an itemized budget narrative? (4 Points)
  - Does the itemized budget narrative relate to the details in the scope of work? (2 Points)
  - Is each itemized budget line reasonable and necessary? (2 Points)
  - Does the budget plan tie to the budget narrative? (2 Points)
  - Is the budget adequate for the scope of the project? (2 Points)
  - Did the applicant describe how a minimum of 75% of funds allocated to sub-awardees will be used for the purchase of food? (4 Points)
  - Did the applicant describe how the minimum of 75% of funds allocated to sub-awardees for food purchases will be expended to purchase food from socially disadvantaged and small business producers? (4 Points)
  - Does the application list adequate equipment, supplies and other resources to complete the project on time? (3 Points)
  - Does the applicant indicate the project is ready to implement quickly? (2 Points)

- d. Resources: Up to 10 points will be awarded based upon the staff qualifications and capacity of the applicant. The application must include the background and qualifications of key personnel to carry out the proposed scope of work. The application should demonstrate the adequacy of the applicant to support the project – facilities, equipment, supplies, etc. The applicant’s resources score will be based upon the following criteria:
- Did the applicant include the background and qualifications of key personnel? Please refer to Key Person/ Staff section on page 18 -19 of the application (4 Points)
  - Does it appear the applicant has sufficient personnel assigned to complete the project on time? Please refer to Key Person/ Staff section on page 18 -19 of the application (2 Points)
  - Does the application describe the facilities to be used? Please refer to page 20- 21, Performance Site/ Locations. (4 Points)

The scores for each factor will be added to obtain a total score for each application. Funding will be awarded to applications according to the total score received. FDACS reserves the right to recommend partial funding of applications.

**XXI. Evaluator(s)**

FDACS’ evaluator(s) will consist of no less than five (5) individuals who FDACS determines have experience and knowledge in the program areas. The evaluator(s) will conduct a fair, impartial, and comprehensive evaluation of applications received in response to this notice of federal financial assistance funding opportunity.

**XXII. Anticipated Announcement and Award Dates**

The evaluation and selection process is expected to be no longer than 45 days after the submission deadline.

**XXIII. Award Notice**

Upon the completion of FDACS’ evaluation of applications, all applicants will be notified regarding their status.

FDACS reserves the right to negotiate and/or adjust the final award amount and scope of work prior to award.

The successful applicants will have thirty (30) days to fully execute the FDACS Subrecipient Agreement. Failure by the subrecipient to sign and return the Subrecipient Agreement, within 30 days upon receipt of the agreement, shall constitute forfeiture of the award.

Although it is the intent of FDACS to expedite the subrecipient grant award process as much as possible, applicants should be aware that execution of a Subrecipient Agreement could be delayed for some time until federal funding is received. Projects should be scheduled accordingly. No costs to be charged against the subrecipient award or counted as match can be incurred before the Subrecipient Agreement is executed.

**XXIV. Programmatic, Administrative and National Policy Requirements**

The applicant shall be in compliance with all laws, rules, and regulations applicable to the federal funds provided by the federal financial assistance funding opportunity.

The applicant shall maintain an accounting system and a set of accounting records which allow for the identification of revenues and expenditures related to this funding opportunity.

**XXV. Acknowledgment of Funding**

The subrecipient shall have an acknowledgement of the USDA support placed on any publication written or published or audiovisual produced with grant support and, if feasible, on any publication reporting the results of, or describing, a grant-supported activity, or audiovisuals produced with grant support. This requirement does not apply to audiovisuals produced as research instruments or for documenting experimentations or findings and not intended for presentation or distribution to the public.

**XXVI. Reimbursement Requests**

All reimbursement requests must be submitted using FDACS' standard payment request packet, unless otherwise noted in the special conditions of the subrecipient agreement and provide supporting documentation for each cost. The subrecipient shall submit the payment request packet to the recipient's grant manager not more often than monthly, but not less often than quarterly. To be eligible for reimbursement, costs shall be allowable, necessary, and reasonable, and must be submitted by budget category consistent with the budget plan submitted with applicant's application.

Bills for any authorized travel expenses shall be submitted and paid in accordance with the rates specified in Section 112.061, Florida Statutes, governing payments by the State for travel expenses. Any travel expenses must be specified in the budget plan and scope of work.

**The FDACS agreement with the federal agency is a cost reimbursement format; therefore, no advance payments will be provided.**

Any work performed on the project and/or any expenditure made prior to a fully executed subrecipient agreement and written authorization from FDACS is ineligible for reimbursement.

**XXVII. Disclaimer**

The receipt of applications in response to the notice of federal financial assistance funding opportunity does not imply or guarantee that any one or all qualified applicants will result in a subrecipient agreement with FDACS.

**XXVIII. Questions**

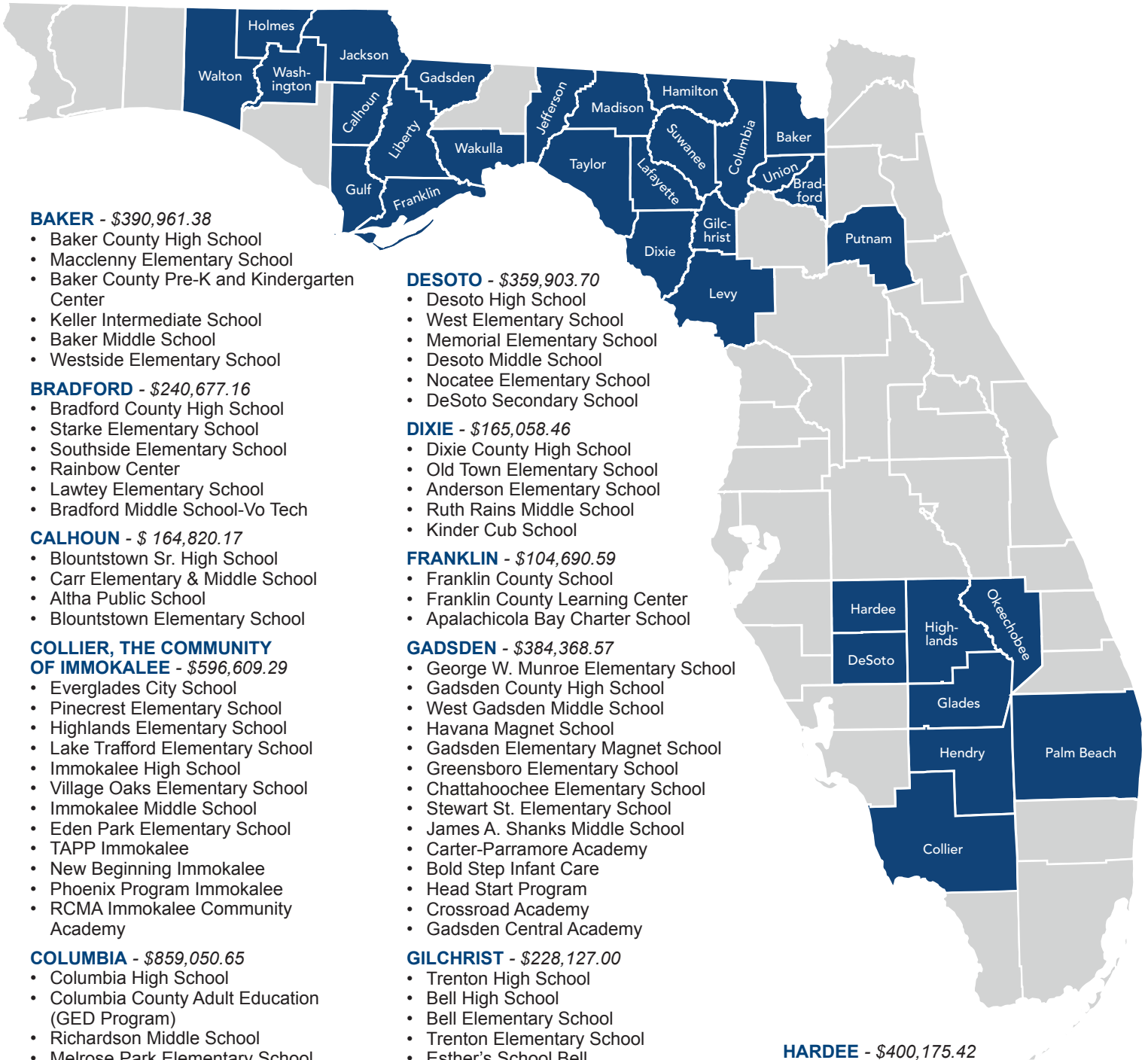
